Rhythm Of The Nations Ipharadisi (ee pah rah dee see) Traditional South African Song *Arranged by David Marlatt*

In 1497, a Portuguese explorer, Vasco da Gama, was the first foreigner to see what it now known as Zululand, South Africa. The actual Zulu clan was founded around 1700 and the sub-tribes were forcibly united by King Shaka in the early 1800s. He was responsible for controlling a population that began at 1,500 and grew to become more than 250,000. Later conflicts with the British found Zulus engaged in more battles defending their lands and way of life. During the apartheid in South Africa (1948-1990), these people were considered low class citizens and suffered greatly from strong discrimination by the reigning government and many of their rights and land were taken away.

Although their past has been filled with conflict, music has always been an important part of their way of life. The rhythmic power of their tribal music and freedom songs have captured the imagination of people all over the world and these songs continue to be performed by choirs and instrumental ensembles everywhere. The words and melodies are inspirational and timeless.
